What Are Placement Costs?

Placement costs <u>ARE</u>

(per diems, foster care maintenance (FCM), boarding costs, etc.)

- Expenses associated with the 'care and maintenance' of a child in foster care (room and board)
- Other items such as clothing, special diets, personal incidentals
- A portion of the placement setting's administrative costs

Placement costs are <u>NOT</u>

• Treatment

Who pays placement costs?

- In Ohio, placement costs are shared by feds and locals
- Federal Title IV-E funds are available on a reimbursable basis for eligible youth
- Eligibility is based on income AND on a set of requirements regarding circumstances and process of removal
- Reimbursement rate = FMAP

Total Placement Spending By Source SFY2023 \$432M



Placement Costs/Context

Placement Cost accounted for <u>31%</u> of the Public Children Services overall spending





Placement costs are <u>increasing</u> even as the number of children in custody has <u>declined</u>



2019 – 2023

Overall placement costs rose by 19% while congregate care costs rose by 27%

Overall Placement Costs: 19% Increase

Congregate Care Costs: 27% Increase

Cost increases for Congregate Foster Care over five years have far outstripped inflation

Foster Home

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Congregate care settings consume more than half of placement costs even though only a quarter of children are placed there







State Initiatives: Current



State **Initiatives:** 2026-2027 Budget Asks

Funding:

- Establish regional children's crisis stabilization centers
- Increase State Child Protection Allocation (SCPA)
- Increase Multi-System Youth line item (in DCY)
- Support and expand the Treatment Foster Home program

Policy:

- Stabilize placement costs
- Improve QRTP quality
- Address juvenile justice crossover
