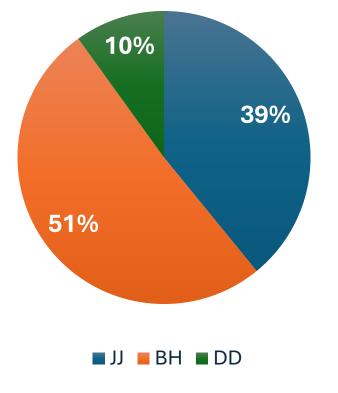

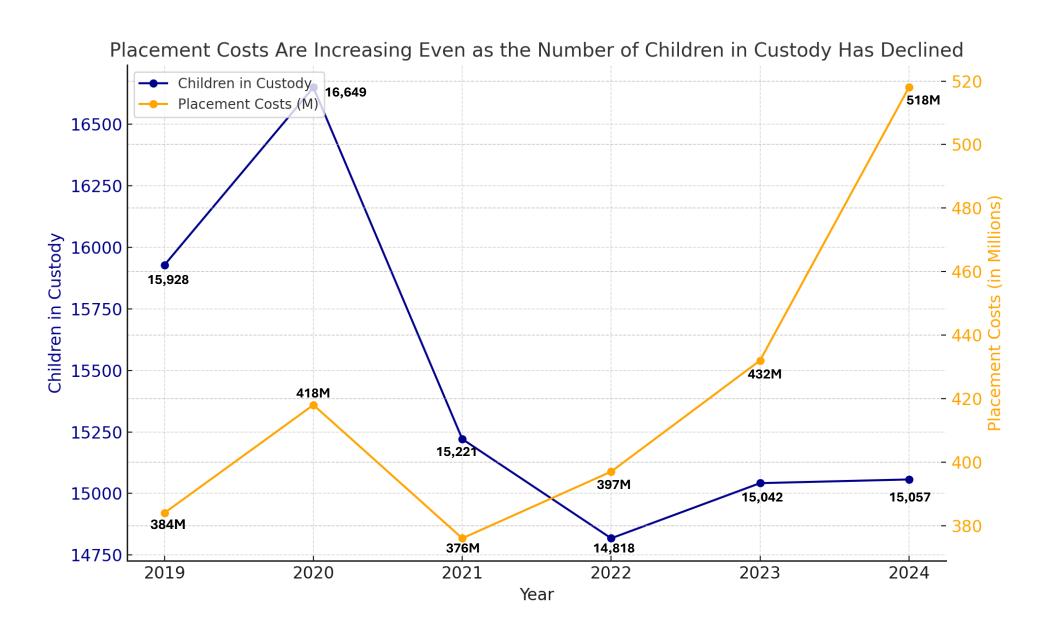
What Are Placement Costs?

Placement costs <u>ARE</u> (per diems, foster care maintenance (FCM), boarding costs, etc.)

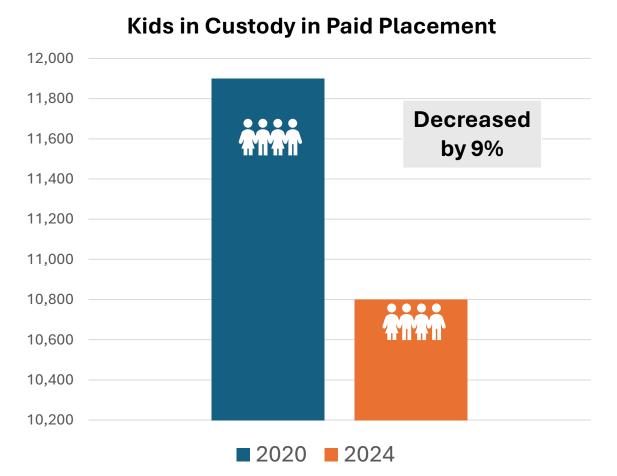
- Expenses associated with the 'care and maintenance' of a child in foster care (room and board)
- Other items such as clothing, special diets, personal incidentals
- A portion of the placement setting's administrative costs

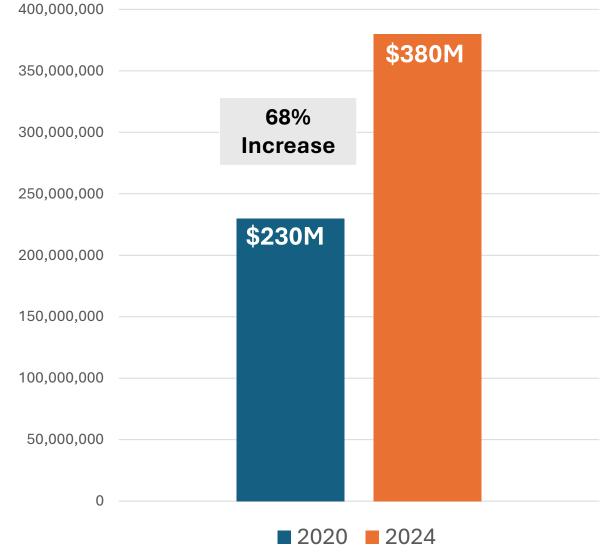

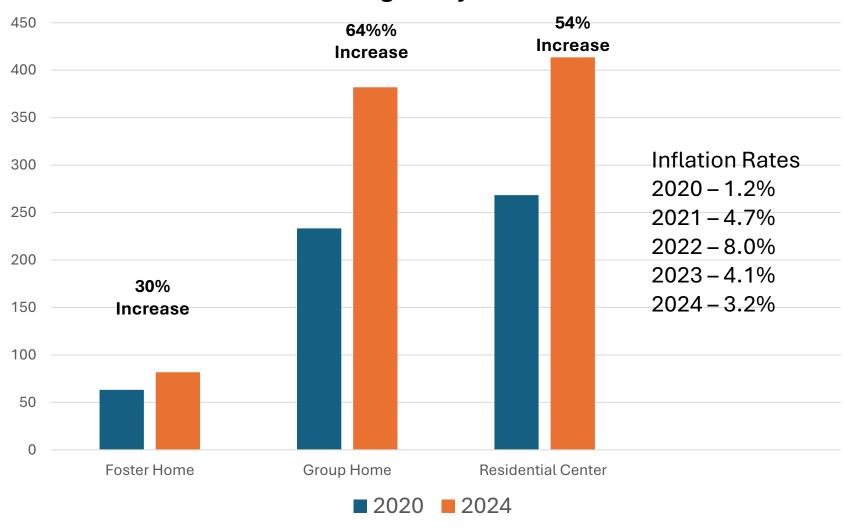


Placement Costs After Reimbursement

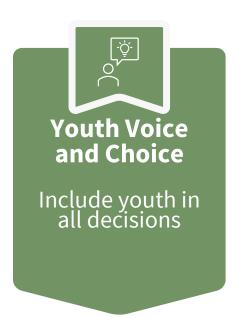

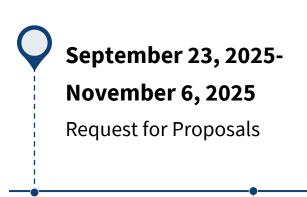

RATE CARDS



RATE CARD CONCEPT

Our Commitment: Children are placed in settings that meet their basic and therapeutic needs

The Problem: Congregate care rates have increased over 50%

Rate Card Benefits:

- Inclusion Rates from all congregate care providers accepting Title IV-E youth
- Predictability Standardized costs across placements
- Transparency Clear, upfront pricing for placement decisions



GOALS OF RATE CARDS

- Standardization: Rate cards will ensure that all agencies pay the same rate for the same bed.
- **Transparency:** Rate cards will ensure that providers include all rates, such as add-on costs, at the beginning and are not added later.
 - Rate cards will include information regarding a provider's level of care, a break-down of the rate for that level of care including additional supervision.
- Clarity: Rate cards will ensure that a child's needs align with the level of treatment and care being billed for. If a youth's needs increase or decrease, the rate charged will change accordingly.
- **Budgeting:** Having transparency, standardization, and a clear level of treatment will allow agencies to budget for out of home placement costs better.
- Implementation: SFY 27 for congregate care providers.
 - House Bill 96 requires rate cards for congregate care providers.



ICF, INCORPORATED CONTRACT

- Partnership: DCY + ICF, Incorporated
- Study Components:
 - Market Rate Study
 Review placement costs by setting type, acuity level, and region
 - Narrow Cost Analysis Random sampling of group homes and residential facilities across varying sizes, locations, and service scopes
 - Stakeholder Review Public and private advisory group provides feedback on data collection
- Outcome:
 - ICF will collect provider set rates establishing their statewide rate card
 - Market Rate Study and Narrow Cost Analysis will leverage Ohio's future placement cost needs



MENU OF SUPPORTS SFY 2026 UPDATES

- Phase 2 for Kinship & Treatment Foster Homes will continue in SFY 2026.
 - \$1.5M budget will support up to 260 kinship homes and 200 foster homes that have not been previously funded.
- Kinship Caregiver Supports Application
 - o Opened October 20 and closed early on October 22 due to high demand.
 - 247 applications approved and pending funding distribution.
- Pathway 2: Treatment Foster Launching January 2026
 - Information session: January 20
 - Application window:
 - Opens January 26 at 10:00 a.m.
 - Planned to remain open until January 28 at 5:00 p.m. but may close early depending on submission volume.
 - o DCY will review all applications to ensure eligibility based on SACWIS data.
