WORKERS' COMPENSATION HANDBOOK CHAPTER REVISED

Another chapter of the County Commissioners Handbook has been completed and is posted on our website. In a continuing effort to keep CCAO members informed, the staff has been updating and writing addition chapters of the County Commissioners Handbook. First published in 1980 and last published in 1994, the Handbook has grown in volume over the past 27 years. Due to the size and frequent changes in the law, the Handbook will no longer be published in notebook form. Chapters are

updates and published on the CCAO website as they are completed.

The newest chapter that has been revised is Chapter 71 - Worker's Compensation. To access this new chapter go to our website at www.ccao.org. Click on Publication, then click on County Commissioners Handbook. Please print a copy of this new chapter for insertion into your Handbook notebook.

This Ohio workers' compensation system provides coverage for medical treatment and lost wages for employees who are injured or contract an occupational disease arising out of and within the course of their employment. It also pays death benefits to a worker's dependent survivors when death results from a work-related injury or occupational disease. The system provides reasonable and reliable benefits to injured workers without requiring proof of fault, while protecting the employer from the uncertainty of negligence actions brought by injured workers. Ohio is one of six states in which the state is the sole provider of Workers' Compensation coverage. The Ohio Bureau of Workers' Compensation is the largest exclusive state fund system in the United States and the largest single line insurance company in the world.

STATE ACTIVITIES

STATEHOOD DAY

What are you doing for Statehood Day? Ohio's history-related organizations invite you to spend Statehood Day, Thursday, March 1, at the Ohio Statehouse advocating for Ohio's history.

Statehood Day – the date in 1803 when Ohio became the nation's 17th state – provides the perfect opportunity to highlight the importance of Ohio's history and help demonstrate how history impacts local communities through economic re-development, education, attracting tourism and adding to Ohioans' quality of life, according to Todd Kleismit, the Ohio Historical Society's director of government relations.

Last year, more than 100 of Ohio's state and local history and heritage advocates joined together in Columbus on Statehood Day to communicate a message to state legislators that history works. "History works in Ohio communities, in Ohio schools and history works on Main Street," Kleismit said. He said he hopes to double the number of people participating in Statehood Day activities in 2007. Statehood Day partners include the Ohio Historical Society, the Ohio Association of Historical Societies & Museums, the Society of Ohio Archivists, the Ohio Archaeological Council, Heritage Ohio, Preservation Ohio, the Ohio Genealogical Society and the Ohio Historic Records Advisory Board.

Statehood Day activities include a briefing about the legislative issues important to history advocates as well as pertinent historic information about Ohio's statehood. Following a luncheon, the group will spend the afternoon meeting in teams with state legislators and their aides. Governor Ted Strickland has been invited to speak at the luncheon.

Statehood Day 2007 activities will take place in the Statehouse Atrium, lasting from 10 am until approximately 4 pm. Participants will take part in a brief program before joining others in small group meetings with state legislators to discuss legislative issues affecting state and local history organizations.

DANN WON'T APPEAL COURT RULING THAT BENEFITS INJURED WORKFARE RECIPIENTS IN BWC CASES

Acting during his first day on the job last week, Attorney General Marc Dann said he would not appeal a court ruling last month that gave welfare recipients who work in return for benefits and are injured on the job the same compensation as regular county employees. Mr. Dann said he agreed with the 10th District Court of Appeals that the calculation of a specific type of workers' compensation for an injured work-relief employee is the same as the one used for other injured employees. "Working with the Industrial Commission, we have decided not to appeal a decision in a case that pits a governmental institution against Ohioans injured while working their way off public assistance," Mr. Dann said in a news release. "The court of appeals recognized that these workers were not being compensated fairly."

The appellate court affirmed a magistrate's decision in a unanimous opinion stemming from injuries in Ashtabula and Mahoning counties. Upheld was a magistrate's order that the Industrial Commission calculate the injured workers' average weekly wage, and entitlement to temporary total disability compensation, at higher levels. Benefits had been set lower based on amounts of public assistance the workers received.

"My decision not to appeal the Beck case exemplifies the three principles at the heart of my administration: first, I will jealously and zealously guard the independence of the attorney general's office, exercising my independent judgment as the Constitution and statutes of Ohio require me to do," Mr. Dann said. "Second, I understand that my clients are the people of the state of Ohio, not just its institutions and agencies. And, above all else, I will work every day to do the right thing - and so will the people in my office," he said.

OHIO EPA PROPOSED WATER QUALITY DRAFT RULE REVISIONS

The Ohio Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is soliciting input on the Agency's review and draft revisions to rules in Ohio Administrative Code (OAC) Chapters 3745-1 - Water Quality Standards, 3745-2 - Implementation of Water Quality Standards, and 3745-33 - Ohio NPDES Permits. Section 121.39 (D) of the Ohio Revised Code requires that Ohio EPA seek this input prior to proposing environmental rules. If the OH EPA decides to proceed with the changes, a public hearing will occur in 2007.

FEDERAL ACTIVITIES

FCC ORDER ON FRANCHISING

On December 20, 2006 the Federal Communications Commission issued an order (not yet released) that would preempt local authorities in cable franchising and place limits on the time needed to negotiate those franchises. The 3-2 party-line vote showed the strength of the telecommunications companies lobbying effort. NACo, along with its local government allies, in a letter to the Commission called into question the legality of the FCC legislating through regulation and essentially overturning statutory law. Several Members of Congress also called into question the FCC's authority in letters to the Commission.

The next steps will be to seek a stay of the Commission's action, and possibly file an appeal of the decision to the federal appeals court. (Contact: Jeff Arnold 202/942-4286 or jarnold@naco.org)

METH CLEAN UP BILL REINTRODUCED

The NACo-supported Methamphetamine Remediation Research Act of 2007 (HR 365) was introduced in the

House on January 10. The legislation would authorize the Environmental Protection Agency to develop voluntary cleanup guidelines for former methamphetamine labs. Currently, there are no federal standards for the remediation of former meth labs. The bill represents a compromise House-Senate version that was nearly passed in the waning days of the 109th Congress. The Science Committee is likely to mark up and pass the bill in the next few weeks and move it to floor consideration. The Senate are expected to introduce a companion bill shortly. HOUSE ENACTS 9/11 COMMISSION RECOMMENDATIONS

On Tuesday, the House of Representatives approved a wide ranging 279 page bill (H.R. 1, Implementing the 9/11 Commission Recommendations Act) that enacts several of the September 11th Commission's recommendations for preventing future terrorist attacks. One of the first measures enacted in the new Congress, HR 1 proposes a number of reforms that will assist counties in their efforts to prepare, prevent, respond and recover from future terrorist threats.

Notably, the legislation revises the contentious issue of distributing key Department of Homeland Security (DHS) grants to state and local governments; creates a new interoperable communications grant program; requires 100 percent screening of cargo transported on ships and planes; strengthens privacy and civil liberties oversight of executive branch programs; expands existing nuclear nonproliferation programs; and implements policy changes for improving U.S. public diplomacy efforts.

The measure, adopted by a 299 to 128 vote faces a likely contentious conference with the Senate, where several Senators have already indicated their opposition to some of the bills provisions. Key obstacles include finding the offsets to pay for several of the legislation's provisions, and lowering

the minimum formula for DHS' key grants to state and local governments.

In the Senate, the Committee on Homeland Security and Government Affairs held a hearing Tuesday on this issue, and they are expected to release a version of the bill within the next couple of weeks. AN ECONOMY THAT WORKS

A blueprint to create an Ohio economy that works better for all was released last week by Policy Matters Ohio, an Ohio-based non-partisan policy research institute. *An Economy That Works* draws upon Ohio traditions of investing in the future, creating opportunity, building the middle class, protecting assets and strengthening public structures, to put forth a set of recommendations that will lead to a stronger, smarter and more sustainable Ohio economy.

As Governor-elect Ted Strickland and dozens of other newly-elected officials take office, the report,

based on research by Policy Matters and other organizations, makes a series of recommendations that new leaders can implement. These include:

1) Invest in the Future by supporting education, infrastructure and energy, so that Ohio is better prepared to meet tomorrow's needs.

2) Create more opportunity in Ohio, by being strategic about economic development, setting high standards, and ensuring that all Ohioans have the chance to contribute to the economy.

3) Ohio has welcomed past generations into the middle class. We need to create and preserve on-ramps to the middle class by making necessities like child care and health care affordable and having a fair, progressive tax system.

4) Ohio can also do more to protect wealth and assets that Ohioans have worked so hard to build. We can do so by reining in the exploitative forms of credit that have grown out of control in Ohio. This includes restoring the consumer sales practices act that has protected Ohio consumers for thirty years, better regulating payday loans, predatory home loans, and tax refund anticipation loans, and encouraging the federal government to regulate exploitative practices by credit card companies.

5) Keep strong public structures that undergird a more successful Ohio. This can be done by continuing to use the public sector to deliver public goods and services, and demanding accountability and excellence from all public systems.

ATTORNEY GENERAL SYLLABUS

SYLLABUS

2006-054

1. Pursuant to the test set forth in *City of Canton v. State*, 95 Ohio St. 3d 149, 2002-Ohio-2005, 766 N.E.2d 963 (syllabus), the provisions

contained in R.C. Chapter 3722, requiring the licensing of adult care facilities by the Ohio Department of Health, constitute a general law for purposes of home-rule analysis under Ohio Const. art. XVIII, § 3. Therefore, a municipal corporation is bound by the provisions of R.C. Chapter 3722 and is not permitted, pursuant to its home-rule powers under Ohio Const. art. XVIII, § 3, to adopt police regulations that conflict with R.C. Chapter 3722 and rules adopted under that chapter.

2. A municipal corporation is not empowered, in the exercise of its police powers under Ohio Const. art. XVIII, § 3, to adopt municipal licensing requirements for adult care facilities licensed by the Ohio Department of Health pursuant to R.C. Chapter 3722, or other regulations that alter, impair, or limit the operation of facilities licensed by the Ohio Department of Health pursuant to R.C. Chapter 3722, because those licensing requirements or regulations would conflict with R.C. Chapter 3722 and rules adopted under that chapter.
