### ASSOCIATION NEWS

#### CCAO SUPPORTS STATE ISSUES 1 & 2; REMAINS NEUTRAL ON ISSUE 3

The meeting of the CCAO Board of Trustees on September 18 was dominated by presentations and discussion on the proposed constitutional amendments that are on the November general election ballot. The Board heard from Bill Hartnett, the Director of the Department of Veteran Affairs on State Issue 1 that would authorize the state to issue up to \$200 million in bonds to provide compensation to veterans of the Persian Gulf, Afghanistan, and Iraq conflicts.

**State Issue 1** would provide stipends of \$100 a month up to a total of \$1,000 for Ohio veterans who served in the Persian Gulf, Afghanistan, and Iraq Conflicts. Furthermore, the state would provide stipends of \$50 a

month up to a total of \$500 for Ohio veterans who served elsewhere during the conflicts. In addition, the family members of qualified deceased Ohio veterans could apply for a \$5,000 death benefit. The Board voted to go on record in support of Issue 1.

**State Issue 2** would require the state to create the Livestock Care Standards Board to prescribe standards for animal care and well-being that endeavor to maintain food safety, encourage locally grown and raised food, and protect Ohio farms and families. The Board would establish standards after considering agricultural best management practices, biosecurity, disease prevention, animal morbidity/mortality data, food safety practices, and the protection of local, affordable food supplies. The bi-partisan Board would be comprised of thirteen members with expertise in farming, animal care, and food safety issues, and chaired by the director of the state department that regulates agriculture. After presentations from the Ohio Farm Bureau Federation and the Humane Society of the US, the board voted to also support State Issue 2.

**State Issue 3** proposes to amend the Ohio Constitution to allow one casino each in Cincinnati, Cleveland, Columbus, and Toledo. Specifically, this proposal would:

- Authorize only one casino facility at a specifically designated location within each of the cities of Cincinnati, Cleveland, Columbus, and Toledo.
- Levy a fixed tax of 33% of gross casino revenue received by each casino operator of the four casino facilities.
- Distribute the casino tax as follows:

51% among all 88 counties in proportion to such counties' respective populations. Half of each county's distribution will go to its largest city if that city's population is above 80,000

34% among all public school districts

5% among all host cities

3% to the Ohio casino control commission

3% to the Ohio state racing commission fund

2% to a state law enforcement training fund

2% to a state problem gambling and addictions fund

- Require each initial licensed casino operator to pay a single \$50,000,000 fee to be used for state job training purposes and make a minimum initial investment of \$250,000,000 in its facility.
- Permit approved types of casino gaming authorized by Michigan, West Virginia, Indiana, and Pennsylvania as of January 1, 2009 or games subsequently authorized by those states.
- Authorize the casinos to operate 24 hours a day, seven days a week, at the discretion of the casino operator and require that the casino facilities shall be subject to all state and local laws and provisions related to health and building codes, but that no local zoning, land use laws, subdivision regulations or similar provisions shall prohibit the development or operation of the casinos at the designated sites.
- Create the Ohio casino control commission which will license and regulate casino operators, management companies retained by such casino operators, key employees, gaming-related vendors, and all gaming authorized by this constitutional provision.

After hearing extensive presentations by groups both supporting and opposing the enactment of the amendment, the CCAO voted to remain neutral on Issue 3.

### CCAO NOMINATING COMMITTEE APPOINTED

Last Friday, the CCAO Board of Trustees approved the appointment of a five member nominating committee. The Committee, appointed by CCAO President Kerry Metzger (Tuscarawas), will be chaired by Daniel Troy, Lake County Commissioner. Other members include: Olen Jackson (Morrow), Tom Wheaton (Carroll), John Love (Putnam), and Mike Curry (Clinton).

It is the responsibility of the committee to recommend a slate of officers and board members to be elected at the Annual Business Meeting on Tuesday, December 8, 2009, during the CCAO/CEAO Winter Conference. Nominations will also be accepted from the floor. The committee will be nominating candidates for the offices of president, first vice president, second vice president, secretary, and treasurer.

In addition, eight members will be nominated to serve on the Board of Trustees for two-year terms. The Nominating Committee will also fill any vacancies that may exist where members elected to a two-year term will not be returning to office or where a member forfeits office for non-attendance. The eight members whose terms to the Board expire this year include: Mike Adelman (Huron), Sam Bassitt (Allen), Nick Kostandaras (Summit), Deborah Lieberman (Montgomery), Joe Moroski (Ashtabula), Richard Myers (Henry), Otto Nicely (Defiance), and Bill Young (Geauga).

The nine members appointed by President Metzger whose one-year term to the Board expires at the end of this year include: Steve Arndt (Ottawa), Thomas Graham (Jefferson), Brian Hill (Muskingum), Peter Lawson Jones (Cuyahoga), Gary Lee (Union), Ann Obrecht (Wayne), Bob Peterson (Fayette), Penny Traina (Columbiana), and Tom Wheaton (Carroll).

In accordance with the CCAO Bylaws, the six most recent past presidents who still hold the office of county commissioner are entitled to a seat on the Board of Trustees. In 2010 those individuals will include: Bob Corbett (Champaign), Lenny Eliason (Athens), Patricia Geissman (Medina), Olen Jackson (Morrow), Kerry Metzger (Tuscarawas), and Daniel Troy (Lake).

The committee must make its recommendations no later than November 3. The report will then be published in the CIDS and an individual copy of the report will be sent to each commissioner.

### RICHARD W. "DICK" McFARLAND

Ohio county government lost a good friend and champion this week when Richard W. "Dick" McFarland passed away on Monday, September 21 following a long illness. A graduate of Lucas High School in Richland County, Dick started his career as a farmer and later worked in the insurance field.

Dick's public service career began when he was elected Monroe Township Trustee, where he served for 15 years and became active in regional planning. He remained active in regional planning for 50 years. Dick served as Richland County Commissioner from 1969 to 1980 and as CCAO President in 1980.

After Dick retired from Richland County, he worked at CCAO until 1996. Dick was instrumental in the development and administration of CORSA and has been called "the father of CORSA." A Richland County native, Dick's church and community involvement stretched for most of his life.

## **CCAO SERVICE CORPORATION NEWS**

### **ROLLOUT OF NEW CCAO SERVICE CORPORATION ENERGY PROGRAM – ELECTRICITY SAVINGS**

As you recall, the CCAOSC initiated its natural gas procurement program in 2000 that has collectively saved 29 counties over \$7.4 million. Recent modifications in the natural gas program increased the participation to over 40 counties! With the recent modifications of the natural gas program, the one question that was repeatedly asked by the various county commissioners: “Can you do this with electricity?” Based upon recent Public Utilities Commissioner of Ohio (PUCO) rulings and relatively low wholesale electric costs, we can now answer “YES”!

The County Commissioners Association of Ohio Service Corporation (CCAOSC) is forming a new program to assist counties on securing lower cost electricity. The CCAOSC has partnered again with Palmer Energy to help manage this electric program. While we will initially focus on counties located in the FirstEnergy area of the state, we fully expect to include counties served by Columbus & Southern and Duke-Ohio shortly thereafter.

To make this a successful program, we need to start collecting data from all counties. The independent energy professionals of Palmer Energy will collect, evaluate, and determine the most advantageous way to bid the members electricity requirement. Like natural gas, we anticipate that pooling the electricity needs of all participating counties will show greater savings to the entire group.

To get started, each county needs to complete and return a response form that will enable the CCAOSC to secure the necessary electric consumption, demand, cost, and other information, needed to attain quotations from the various potential suppliers. ## **COUNTY ACTIVITIES**

### **WYANDOT COUNTY SOLAR ENERGY PROJECT**

Quiet, rural Wyandot County is a major player in a \$30 million solar energy project. American Electric Power, juwi solar, The Ohio State University, Wyandot County Office of Economic Development, and the Wyandot County Commissioners are all part of a solar energy facility to be built on 80 acres of county-owned property near the Wyandot County Airport. The project is expected to be completed in 2010 and will supply power that will be bought by AEP, who will sign a 20-year lease.

Wyandot Solar started as a result of the passage of SB 221 in 2008 that set the standard for Ohio utilities requiring that 25 percent of their sales come from advanced energy (i.e., wind, solar, and biomass) by 2025.

Last year, AEP issued an RFP and juwi solar, a worldwide producer of wind, solar, and biogas energy, was the best and lowest bid. The solar panels will be made in Ohio by First Solar, located in Toledo, which is the leading manufacturer of solar panels in the world. The low-profile panels will absorb sunlight, give off no glare, be low-noise, and 100 percent emission free. Approximately, 80-100 short-term jobs during construction and several long-term jobs after the plant is in operation will be created. Energy to serve 1,500 houses will be generated by Wyandot Solar.

This green energy project is a win-win situation for Wyandot County with benefits that include taxing income to the community, a compensation agreement to the school system, solar generation systems and renewable energy curriculums for three high schools, construction jobs, and new technology that could lead to opportunities for business attraction.
