FUTURE CHANGES IN OPERS; 2ND WEDNESDAY'S SEMINAR – JULY 14

CCAO will be hosting "Future Changes in OPERS" – the fourth in a series of "Second Wednesday's" seminars – on Wednesday, July 14 at the CCAO Offices, 209 East State Street, in Columbus.

This seminar will focus on the recommended benefit changes that the Ohio Public Employees Retirement System (OPERS) Board of Trustees submitted to the Ohio Retirement Study Council in November 2009. These changes to benefits are designed to strengthen the pension system, with the added goal of maintaining adequate funding for health care. Depending on legislative implementation, the recommended changes to benefits will build on past actions by the Board to prepare for longer life expectancies of retirees, to encourage member engagement in their retirement planning and to correct inequities resulting from benefit subsidization.

The seminar will begin sharply at 9:30 a.m. and will conclude promptly at 12:30 p.m. Registrations will be accepted only by email. COUNTY BULLETIN PROVIDES DATA ON UNVOTED (INSIDE MILLAGE) LEVIES BY COUNTY AND PURPOSE

CCAO will be publishing a series of County Data Exchange bulletins on its website over the next few weeks. Attached to this edition of CIDS is Bulletin 2010 - 02 on County Unvoted Property Tax Levies for collection in 2009 by guaranteed inside millage rate, current inside rate and purposes. Basic data for this table was provided by Ohio Department of Taxation, Division of Tax Equalization (TR1 Report) from information submitted by county auditors. The guaranteed inside millage data is drawn from records of the Department of Taxation and is equal to 2/3rds of the millage levied during 1929 to 1933 prior to a constitutional amendment lowering the number of unvoted property tax mills from 15 to 10. OSU EXTENSION NEWS

CARROLL COUNTY EXTENSION OFFICE TO CLOSE ON JUNE 11, 4-H TO END ON AUGUST 8; JACKSON & HIGHLAND COUNTY EXTENSION OFFICES WILL REMAIN OPEN

Last Friday, Ohio State University (OSU) Extension announced the closing of the Carroll County Extension office this summer. Carroll County was one of four Ohio counties that had Extension levies on the May 4 ballot. With the defeat of the levy, Carroll County does not have the ability to generate local matching funds needed to keep the Extension office open.

"Unfortunately, we must make some tough business decisions about the future of Extension in counties that are unable to financially support this vital partnership, which also relies on state and federal funding," said Keith Smith, associate vice president for agricultural administration at The Ohio State University and director of OSU Extension. "This is a gut-wrenching decision, because we realize that OSU Extension and the services we support, including 4-H youth development, affect the lives of many people in each of Ohio's 88 counties." said Smith.

Carroll County's Extension office will close effective June 11, ending all agricultural, natural resource, community development and family and consumer science programming and staffing immediately. OSU Extension will work with the local 4-H educator to continue the Carroll County 4-H program until the close of the Ohio State Fair on August 8.

Carroll County Extension's advisory committee plans to seek funding again via a levy request on the November ballot. If this ballot issue is successful, OSU Extension will be able to reopen the office and restore services once the revenue generated via the levy is collected. There are no local funds from other sources available to help support the office at this time.

Two other counties – Jackson and Highland – also had Extension levies that were not successful in the May primary election. Jackson County's advisory committee also plans to seek funds again on the November ballot. Until then, its local match will be funded with contributions from local donors.

Highland County Extension is seeking funding from other sources, including the county government general fund, Extension's preferred method of local funding. Highland County has minimal funding available to operate its Extension office until the end of the calendar year.

Extension works with businesses, farms and communities to help them be more prosperous, with families in the areas of nutrition, food safety and financial management, and with children through 4-H Youth Development programming. "We want nothing more than to continue our important work in all communities throughout Ohio," Smith said.

COUNTY COST SHARE FOR EDUCATORS

OSU Extension has announced it will be maintaining rates charged to counties for the cost of county educators in calendar year 2011 at the same amount as they are in 2010.

OSU Extension will experience a reduction of \$1 million in state funds for fiscal year 2011 from the 2010 appropriation, but through careful management of resources we are able to avoid passing any additional costs on to our county partners. All of us are facing unprecedented financial challenges and Extension will do everything we can to maintain our services and minimize cost increases to county government.

The county cost share for Extension educators for 2011 is \$25,000 for the first educator, \$38,200 for the second educator, and \$40,000 for the third or more educators.

CUYAHOGA COUNTY COMMISSIONERS RECOGNIZE 200th ANNIVERSARY

On June 2, the Cuyahoga County Commissioners Tim Hagan, Peter Lawson Jones and Jimmy Dimora recognized the 200th anniversary of the first Cuyahoga County Commissioners' meeting. The bicentennial celebration includes a lecture series, quilt competition and a time capsule, which will include sports tickets and a copy of *The Plain Dealer*, to be sealed in August and preserved for another 200 years at the county archives building.

County archivist Judith Cetina brought a cake with 20 candles, stressed the importance of celebrating the past, and thanked all commissioners for the last 200 years. Voters last November overwhelmingly approved a county charter that replaces 200 years of commissioner rule with an elected county executive and 11-member council.

GREATER OHIO WHITE PAPER RECOMMENDING STATE POLICIES FOR TRANSFORMING OHIO'S CITIES RELEASED

Akron, Canton, Cincinnati, Cleveland, Columbus, Dayton, Toledo and Youngstown have been the drivers of Ohio's economy – and played important roles in the national economy - for most of the 20th century. Today, however, these “Big Eight” cities are experiencing sustained, long-term population loss, turning them into Ohio's “shrinking cities” and prompting city and state officials to ask: How will they reshape and reinvent themselves? “Ohio's Cities at a Turning Point: Finding the Way Forward” attempts to answer just that question.

The white paper, released last month by the Greater Ohio Policy Center and the Brookings Institution's Metropolitan Policy Program, lists 10 state-level policy recommendations to guide leaders as cities undergo a physical transformation to become smaller but stronger. The white paper, officially released at a summit in Washington, D.C., focused on the future of communities whose economies relied heavily on the automotive industry and other manufacturing sectors.

Two important announcements affecting Ohio announced at the conference include:

- The release of more than \$800 million in funds to clean up and revitalize 90 former General Motors facilities, including approximately eight plants in Ohio, allowing the sites to be put back into productive use.
- The second major announcement came from the Ford Foundation, which is committing \$200 million to a five year effort to transform the way cities and suburbs work together, to promote a strong regional approach that interweaves housing, transportation and land-use policy to foster greater economic growth.

These funding announcements challenge legislators at the state level to act in kind with aggressive state policy and local practices to ensure the successful turnaround of auto communities. Both of these important announcements will help spur the practices that are called for the Greater Ohio and Brookings report, “Restoring Prosperity: Transforming Ohio's Communities for the Next Economy” released earlier this spring.
