Depending on legislative implementation, the recommended changes to benefits will build on past actions by the Board to prepare for longer life expectancies of retirees, to encourage member engagement in their retirement planning and to correct inequities resulting from benefit subsidization.

EFFICIENT GOV NOW NAMES AWARD RECIPIENTS; MAHONING COUNTY – TOP PROJECT FOR A SECOND YEAR

Since 2009, the Fund for Our Economic Future has sponsored the EfficientGovNow (www.efficientgovnow.org) competition to encourage greater citizen advocacy for more collaborative, efficient local government in Northeast Ohio. Residents were asked to rank their top three government collaborations from 10 finalists chosen by the Fund. The four award recipients will share \$330,000 for their projects.

For the second year in a row, a Mahoning County project was voted the top project. “Grounds for Change: Creating the First Collaborative Land Bank for the Mahoning County Region” is a collaborative effort by the cities of Youngstown, Campbell, Struthers, Austintown and Lien Forward, Ohio to establish the Mahoning County region’s first collaborative land bank. The goal is to have the land bank running by the second quarter of 2011. Cuyahoga County has established a similar program.

Ranking second in the competition was Stark County’s initiative for a Countywide 9-1-1 Dispatch Center that will transform 10 dispatch centers and one call center into a single operation, saving more than \$2 million a year.

The third place winner was “Let the Sun Shine: The Cleveland – First Suburbs Solar Special Improvement District Pilot Program” – an effort to stimulate greater use of solar electricity.

The Fund chose to award a fourth collaboration among smaller communities in Ashtabula, Columbiana, Summit, Carroll, and Lorain counties for a Geographical Information System (GIS) Cooperative for Small Communities and Utilities.

The Fund for Our Economic Future (www.futurefundneo.org) is a collaboration of more than 100 foundations, organizations and philanthropists from across Northeast Ohio that strengthens the region’s economic competitiveness through grant making, civic engagement and research.

STATE ACTIVITIES

CONTROLLING BOARD WRAPS UP FY10 WITH \$673,873 FOR TORNADO DISASTER RELIEF IN NORTHWEST OHIO

This week, the State Controlling Board unanimously agreed to make \$673,873 in state disaster relief money available to help cover un-reimbursed expenses of local government and individuals as a result of a deadly tornado in three northwest Ohio counties the first weekend of June. The Controlling Board, meeting for the last time in fiscal year 2010, approved the transfer of the money from its emergency purposes account to a disaster relief fund within the Ohio Emergency Management Agency (OEMA).

Six persons died as a result of the storm system that swept through Fulton, Ottawa and Wood counties the night of June 5. The money approved for transfer would be used specifically for the damage from the northwest Ohio storms. Governor Ted Strickland last also requested President Barack Obama issue a disaster

declaration for the three counties. Some of the state funds could be used to help local governments and individuals provide required matching amounts to attract any federal aid that becomes available.

The twister damaged 164 homes, businesses, and government structures, with 45 of them destroyed. The Lake Township administration, emergency medical service and dispatch center was lost, as was the Lake Local High School.

OHIO DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL RESOURCES, RECOVERY CONSERVATION CORP PROGRAM

In April, 2009 the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) created the Recovery Conservation Corp Program (RCC). The RCC offered work experience and work sites to youth aged 18-24 to improve Ohio's state parks, natural areas, forests, wildlife areas and scenic river access sites.

The RCC initiative was a collaborative effort between ODNR, the Ohio Civil Services Employees Association Local 11 (OCSEA/AFSCME), the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services (ODJFS), Workforce Investment Areas (Areas), and One-Stop Systems. Through these partnerships, the RCC 2009 program was very successful. More than 358 youth worked on 59 ODNR sites located throughout the state. The youth gained valuable work experiences, developed new skills and a backlog of environmental work was accomplished. Some of the experiences gained were working to clear trails, eradicating invasive species, building board walks, erecting retaining walls, landscaping, tree trimming, brush removal, window repair/replacement, painting, ecological management, picnic table construction, etc.

ODNR has developed a list of projects and sites for RCC 2010 and is interested in partnering with the counties to once again provide the work sites and work experiences for the youth. READY OHIO: PREPARE. PLAN. STAY INFORMED

The Ohio Department of Public Safety recently launched its website focusing on the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) Ready campaign and listing readiness and preparedness tips for incidents that frequently occur in Ohio. ReadyOhio (<http://publicsafety.ohio.gov/NPM/index.stm>) provides links to the Ready campaigns Get a Kit, Make a Plan, Be Informed, and Listo.gov. (<http://www.listo.gov>) in Spanish. The site also provides easy access to fact sheets on incidents that are common in Ohio. It asks Ohioans if they are ready for home fire prevention, floods, thunder and lightning, power outages, tornadoes, winter storms and evacuation. The pages provide definitions and descriptions of each hazard and provide a link to more complete disaster supplies kit checklist, provided by the American Red Cross.

FEDERAL ACTIVITIES

MEDICAID ASSISTANCE RESTORED

This week, the Senate is set to vote on the extenders bill (H.R. 4213 - The American Jobs & Closing Tax Loopholes Act of 2010. Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-NV)) and Finance Committee Chair Max Baucus (D-MT) unveiled their manager's amendment to H.R. 4213 on June 8. The manager's amendment is the starting point for the Senate's consideration of the package of tax breaks and benefits extensions passed by the House before Memorial Day. Reid and Baucus restored the six month extension of the ARRA Medicaid federal medical assistance (FMAP) aid to states and counties which had been dropped from the House bill over Blue Dog Democrats' concern over its \$24 billion price tag. NACo strongly supports the provision. The ARRA FMAP aid expires December 31, 2010.

The core bill remains largely unchanged from the House passed version. It would provide \$39.8 billion to revive and extend expanded unemployment benefits through November 30, allocate \$1 billion to the summer jobs program to support more than 350,000 jobs for ages 14 to 24 through summer employment programs. RED FLAGS RULE ENFORCEMENT DELAYED – AGAIN

The Federal Trade Commission has once again delayed enforcement of the Red Flags Rule, which requires all such entities that have “covered accounts” to develop and implement written identity theft prevention programs to help identify, detect, and respond to patterns, practices, or specific activities – known as “red flags” – that could indicate identity theft.

The Commission will now forebear any enforcement actions until December 31, 2010. The Rule's broad definition of "creditor" included many entities that have not traditionally considered themselves creditors – including counties. Confusion over the scope of the Rule and continued congressional consideration of legislation affecting its application have resulted in several enforcement delays since the Rule became effective on January 1, 2008. PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION PRESERVATION ACT OF 2010 INTRODUCED

Last week, U.S. Senator Sherrod Brown signed-on to co-sponsor S.3412 – the Public Transportation Preservation Act of 2010. This legislation would provide emergency funding to Ohio’s transit agencies to rehire workers and restore service routes. Ohio’s 59 transit systems employ more than 5,200 people and serve large cities and small towns across Ohio, ranking our state 12th in the nation for public transit ridership. With this bill, urban and rural transit systems would receive critical funds to help shore up budgets and save and create transit jobs, prevent fare increases, and preserve our mass transit service to ease the burden facing Ohio’s transit agencies. S.3412 was read twice and referred to the Senate Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs.

In March, Senator Brown introduced S.3189, a bill to amend title 49 of the United States Code to allow for additional transportation assistance grants. This bill would give transit agencies the flexibility they need to use federal funds for operating assistance in addition to making capital improvements. S.3189 was read twice and referred to the Senate Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs.

NEW JUSTICE-RELATED GRANT AVAILABLE

Local solicitations for new justice-related grants have been released for the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program from the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs’ Bureau of Justice Assistance. The JAG Program provides local governments with funding to support a variety of program areas including law enforcement, courts, prevention, education, corrections, treatment, planning and

evaluation. An application must be submitted through OJP's Grants Management System. Registration with OJP's Grant Management System is required prior to application submission. All applications are due by 8:00 p.m. on June 30, 2010.
