2010 GENERAL FUND, ALL FUNDS & TAX RATE SURVEY

CCAO in conjunction with OSU Extension has prepared a survey to gather general fund, all funds and tax rate (increase/decrease) information to help CCAO’s policy team prepare for next year’s legislative deliberations on the State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2012 – 2013 biennial appropriations bill. In light of the budgetary shortfall facing the state in the next biennium, CCAO needs to gather accurate general fund and all fund data that demonstrates the efforts of counties to manage county budgets in a time of declining resources.

A printable copy of the survey was emailed to each county commissioners’ clerk and each county administrator. In addition, each commissioners’ clerk and county administrator received an electronic version of this survey from Brad Cole, Managing Director of Research, which was created in cooperation with Debby Lewis in the Program Development and Evaluation Unit of OSU Extension. The printable copy of the survey is intended to help commissioners’ staff prepare answers to survey questions prior to responding to the electronic

survey which was emailed with a link to the electronic survey document. Coordination between commissioners' clerks and county administrators will be necessary to assure that only one electronic survey response is submitted back to CCAO from each county.

In order to have sufficient time to compile the data from the electronic survey, CCAO asks each county to respond to the electronic survey by **Friday, October 15**. PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CCAO CODE OF REGULATIONS (BYLAWS)

Earlier this year, CCAO President Paula Brooks appointed a Bylaws Review Committee to perform a review that is required every five years by our Code of Regulations. Members of the Committee included the following county commissioners: Co-Chairs Kerry Metzger (Tuscarawas) and Ted Kalo (Lorain), and Committee members Doug Corcoran (Ross), Ed Humphrey (Clermont), Daniel Troy (Lake), Marilyn Reid (Greene), and Penny Traina (Columbiana).

The Committee has recommended to the Board of Trustees to adopt a variety of changes to the CCAO Bylaws. The proposed changes are linked to an article on the front page of www.ccao.org. As you will see when you review the proposed changes, many of the recommended changes are simply language changes to Bylaws and to change the name of the current Board of Trustees to a Board of Directors.

In addition, the Committee has made the following substantive changes to the Bylaws:

- To clarify that active members of CCAO will include any elected county executive and all of the members of the legislative authority of a county that adopts a county charter or an alternative form of county government, in addition to all members of a board of county commissioners.
- To specify that voting at the annual or any special meeting of CCAO will be by an official representative of each county.
- To specify that each board of county commissioners shall, by resolution, designate the official voting representative and an alternate. In the case of a county that has adopted a charter or alternative form of county government that has an elected executive, the official voting representative and alternate shall be designated by the elected executive. In the case of a county that has adopted a charter or an alternative form that has an appointed county executive, the official voting representative and alternate shall be designated by the county's legislative authority, by ordinance or resolution.
- A quorum at the annual meeting is changed to eliminate the current requirement that one-third of the members must be present.

Before the Board adopts the proposed amendments to the Bylaws, CCAO wants to give all Commissioners and the Summit County Executive and County Council the opportunity to comment on the proposed amendments. CDE BULLETIN PROVIDES CURRENT DESIGNATIONS OF COUNTY CHILD SUPPORT ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES

Attached to this edition of CIDS is County Data Exchange (CDE) Bulletin 2010 – 08 which provides the current designations of county child support enforcement agencies. Ohio law requires each county to have a Child Support Enforcement Agency (CSEA). The board of commissioners may designate one of the following as the CSEA: The County Department of Job and Family Services (CDJFS); a bureau within the Common Pleas Court; the County Prosecutor; or a free standing agency under the county commissioners. Commissioners may change the designation, but must strictly follow the provisions of ORC Section 307.981 and Ohio Administrative Code Sections 5101:9 – 1 – 22 and 5101:9 – 1 – 23.

IN MEMORIAM

RICHARD C. BERTZ

Former Henry County Commissioner Richard C. Bertz passed away on Tuesday, September 28, 2010. Bertz was born in Michigan, but spent much of his life in the Deshler area where he was raised by his late aunt and uncle. He will be remembered as a pilot, teacher and community leader. During his private sector career, he was a field manager for the Campbell Soup Company and taught vocational agriculture. Dick's public service career included serving as Henry County Commissioner from 1993 to 2002 and as a member of the Napoleon School Board. During his 28-year military career, Dick was a Lieutenant Colonel and pilot in the U.S. Air Force and for the Ohio Air National Guard's 145th Air Wing Squadron. He flew hundreds of missions as an air to air refueling pilot. He earned a bachelor's and master's degree from The Ohio State University, where he was an outstanding athlete serving as captain and selected an All-American for the soccer team. GOVERNOR ANNOUNCES DISASTER AID TO FARMERS IN MOST OHIO COUNTIES

Farmers in 79 counties will be able to tap into federal aid as a result of being declared primary or contiguous natural disaster areas. Gov. Ted Strickland had requested a disaster designation from the U.S. Department of Agriculture based on several natural disasters this year. USDA Secretary Thomas Vilsack granted the request for 41 counties. Farms in an additional 38 contiguous counties are also eligible for the federal assistance.

The available assistance includes Farm Service Agency (FSA) emergency loans and the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments (SURE) Program. Farmers in these eligible counties have eight months from the date of this disaster declaration to apply for emergency loan assistance. For more information, farmers should contact their local FSA. STATE AUDITOR FINDING COULD COST CLARK COUNTY NEARLY \$300,000

A finding in Clark County's annual audit could cost the county roughly \$278,855 next year. In a report released last week, the State Auditor said the county paid itself too much federal money for county buildings that house federal programs. The state wants some of the money back, but county officials said that the mistake was not theirs.

The state audit found that no public money was illegally appropriated or expended, but incorrectly transferred between accounts. The accounting problem that didn't cost any money, but it over-charged for leases for federal programs. The report says the county charged too much for rent to federal grants for food, welfare, child support and medical programs.

All of these programs are administered by Clark County JFS from its office, a former industrial site that was rehabbed in the 1990s. Since then — with the state's permission— the county has charged rent based on the 20-year bond that paid for the buildings, not the 40-year depreciation schedule it turns out they should have used.

The county recently refinanced the bond to bring its annual cost down and bring it into federal guidelines, which county officials say will cost the feds more in the long run. But the state could cut its funding next year to recoup the \$278,855 it says was over-charged last year for those programs.

FEDERAL INFORMATION

CONGRESS PASSES STOP GAP MEASURE INCLUDING HUMAN SERVICES EXTENDERS

On September 29, Congress passed a continuing resolution to keep the federal government running through December 3 and recessed until after the elections. The measure (H.R. 3081) funds most programs at FY2010 levels. It passed the House by a vote of 228-194 and the Senate by a vote of 69-30.

In addition to the stop gap funding, the continuing resolution includes short-term extensions of several human services programs that would have otherwise expired September 30. These include the Temporary Assistance for Needy Family Block Grant (TANF), the TANF supplemental grants, the TANF contingency fund, the School Lunch and other child nutrition programs, and the Interagency Council on Homelessness.

The child support enforcement incentive match was not extended, but it may be taken up in the lame duck session. The TANF emergency contingency fund was not extended either. Another provision that was allowed to expire was Supplemental Security Income for approximately 5600 elderly and disabled refugees.

The child nutrition program short-term extension was included in the continuing resolution because the House did not take up the Senate four-year reauthorization bill (S.3307). The Senate bill is paid in part by a reduction in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program payments, which has become quite controversial. This is another issue that will have to be resolved during the lame duck session. ATTORNEY GENERAL OPINIONS

SYLLABUS

2010-025

1. A joint board of county commissioners established under R.C. 6133.02 to undertake a joint county ditch improvement is not a “county board” for the purpose of receiving legal representation from a prosecuting attorney under R.C. 309.09(A). Consequently, a prosecuting attorney is not required to represent a joint board of county commissioners established under R.C. 6133.02.
2. A county commissioner serving on joint board of county commissioners established under R.C. 6133.02 is not by reason of that service a “county officer” for the purpose of receiving legal representation from a prosecuting attorney under R.C. 309.09(A). Consequently, a prosecuting attorney is not required to represent a county commissioner serving on a joint board of county commissioners with respect to a county commissioner’s discharge of duties related to the actions and decisions of the joint board of county commissioners established under R.C. Chapter 6133.
3. An auditor and treasurer who serve pursuant to R.C. 6133.07 as the fiscal agents of counties participating in a joint county ditch improvement are not by reason of that service “county officers” for the purpose of receiving legal representation from a prosecuting attorney under R.C. 309.09(A). Consequently, a prosecuting attorney is not required to represent an auditor and treasurer in their capacity as fiscal agents of counties participating in a joint county ditch improvement.
4. An engineer who serves a joint board of county commissioners or a joint county ditch improvement pursuant to R.C. 6133.08 is not by reason of that service a “county officer” for the purpose of receiving legal representation from a prosecuting attorney under R.C. 309.09(A). Consequently, a prosecuting attorney is not required to represent an engineer who serves a joint board of county commissioners or joint county ditch improvement pursuant to R.C. 6133.08.
5. A clerk who serves a joint board of county commissioners or a joint county ditch improvement pursuant to R.C. 6133.04 and R.C. 6133.06 is not by reason of that service a “county officer” for the purpose of receiving legal representation from a prosecuting attorney under R.C. 309.09(A). Consequently, a prosecuting attorney is not required to represent a clerk who serves a joint board of county commissioners or joint county ditch improvement pursuant to R.C. 6133.04 and R.C. 6133.06.
6. A prosecuting attorney does not have discretion to provide legal representation to a joint board of county commissioners established under R.C. 6133.02 or an individual member of the joint board of county commissioners.

7. A prosecuting attorney does not have discretion to provide legal representation to an auditor and treasurer who serve as the fiscal agents of counties participating in a joint county ditch improvement pursuant to R.C. 6133.07, an engineer who serves a joint board of county commissioners or joint county ditch improvement pursuant to R.C. 6133.08, or a clerk who serves a joint board of county commissioners or joint county ditch improvement pursuant to R.C. 6133.04 and R.C. 6133.06.
8. A joint board of county commissioners established under R.C. Chapter 6133 has implied authority to retain legal counsel for performance of its statutory duties and for the purpose of representing and advising officers serving on behalf of a joint county ditch improvement.

The Commissioners may designate the following as the CSEA: The County Department of Job and Family Services (CDJFS); a bureau within the Common Pleas Court; the County Prosecutor (PRO); or, a Free Standing Agency under the Commissioners (FSA). Commissioners may change the designation, but must strictly follow the provisions of ORC Section 307.981 and Ohio Administrative Code Sections 5101:9-1-22 and 5101:9-1-23. The following table shows the current designations.
