**STATE ACTIVITIES****INTERNET, OUT-OF-STATE SALES FACE 'NEW' TAX**

The many Ohio businesses that have long ignored paying the "use tax" to the state are going to find it increasingly difficult to dodge it in the future. Since 1936 — dating to a time when some neighboring states didn't have a sales tax — Ohioans have been required to pay tax on goods bought outside the state that did not carry a sales tax. The tax eventually slipped out of sight, only to return to the spotlight with the explosion of business over the Internet. Now, the state wants its piece, and it's targeting businesses first, although individuals also are supposed to pay up.

The state's tax preparers, through continuing education programs required by the Ohio Department of Taxation, are being marshaled to take the message to their customers. Ohio also has instituted an amnesty program that allows businesses to get right with the state without being punished. Even though the tax has been on the books for 75 years, it's easy to guess how it will be viewed.

The state doesn't know how much it stands to collect from the effort or how many businesses are not in compliance. It just knows that with the rise in Internet and mail-order sales, the numbers probably are substantial. "We don't have an idea," said Joe Testa, Ohio's tax commissioner. "Hundreds of thousands of businesses in Ohio may have a use-tax liability." A tax amnesty in 2006 aimed at all type of state taxes collected \$59.7 million and identified 1,500 taxpayers who owed anywhere from \$500 to \$2 million in use taxes.

Even if many don't know about it, the use tax is a big deal for the state, already generating more than \$1 billion a year. Compliance on the use tax also might spur the Ohio economy as companies make more purchases in

the state after losing the tax advantage of buying elsewhere. An amnesty program will start Oct. 1, allowing businesses to get right with the state without being punished. But even though it is almost two months away, the effort is catching the attention of the business community. Big companies with paid finance staffs know their companies need to report the use tax to the state.

The use tax is a complement to the state sales tax. It is meant to create an equal playing field by requiring businesses that buy items out of state, bypassing Ohio sales tax, to pay the use tax instead. If a company pays out-of-state sales tax on an item it buys, then no use tax is owed in Ohio if the two rates are the same.

The Taxation Department cites the example of an Ohio company that wants to buy an executive desk. A company in Columbus and a company in Buffalo, N.Y., both sell the same desk for \$2,600. By not paying the use tax, the company that wants the desk can save \$149 by buying it from the New York company, even with higher shipping costs, according to a scenario set out by Ohio tax regulators. The New York company doesn't collect Ohio sales tax on the purchase.

But Ohio state law requires a use tax to be paid unless sales tax already has been paid or unless there is an exemption that applies to the sale. Additionally, many Internet and mail-order companies don't collect Ohio sales taxes on purchases, the state says, leaving that burden on the buyer to report the purchase. The use tax also applies to individual taxpayers, who also are turning more to the Internet for purchases. There is no similar enforcement plan in the works by the state that targets individuals, however. Miscommunication between buyers and sellers also results in failure to pay the use tax. A recent audit found that one company owed \$1.8 million after it thought a supplier was charging the tax.

Two years ago, legislators authorized the hiring of 90 auditors with the goal of reviewing the books of more small- and medium-size businesses. Those audits revealed a lack of understanding by many businesses about the use tax, said John Trippier, the department's audit administrator. That led state tax officials to begin putting an education program together for businesses that would advise them about the tax and where it was applicable. The main goal was to get businesses registered with the state and to have them comply going forward, Testa said.

As the General Assembly began to debate the state budget that went into effect July 1, some legislators asked tax regulators to take another look at their program, Testa said. When tax preparers and consultants began to tell clients about the state's education and amnesty program, those clients began to complain to their legislators. The result was a lengthy, more business-friendly amnesty that was folded into the new state budget.

The amnesty goes into effect Oct. 1 and runs until May 2013. It requires all businesses that voluntarily enter into an amnesty program to remit use taxes going back to Jan. 1, 2009. Any taxes that would have been due before that will be forgiven. There will be no penalties or interest. The state can set up payment plans if the liability tops \$1,000. The amnesty does not apply to all businesses. Businesses that have been assessed use tax before are not eligible. As is the case with other forms of taxes that businesses pay, the state will count on honesty when it comes to determining use-tax liabilities. (Source: *The Columbus Dispatch*, 8/8/11)

### TANF AT RISK AS FEDS UPSET OVER OHIO'S LOW 'WORK PARTICIPATION RATE'

The federal government recently rejected Ohio's explanation for why so few welfare recipients are working and now the state and counties are planning how to boost the "work participation rate" to avoid stiff penalties.

Ohio previously asked the federal government to overlook its failure to meet the requirement that at least half the families receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) be employed or participating in programs designed to help them find a job. The state submitted "reasonable cause" claims for fiscal years 2007, 2008, and 2009, saying the poor economy and high unemployment rate should exempt Ohio from a penalty, for the three years combined, of nearly \$275 million.

The federal Department of Health & Human Services (HHS) finally responded to the first claim late last month, saying the state's economy, lack of education and work activities, and high welfare caseloads were not factors that could exempt Ohio from the nearly \$33 million penalty for missing the 2007 requirement. The dollar amount effectively doubles because TANF money has to be replaced with general revenue.

Steven Krasner, TANF regional program manager with HHS's Administration for Children and Families, said in a letter that Ohio could dispute the penalty, enter into a corrective action plan, or submit more information for the reasonable cause claim.

Department of Job and Family Services (ODJFS) spokesman Ben Johnson said the administration chose to submit a corrective action plan that will show how Ohio can bring its all-family work participation rate, which includes single parent households, up from the current 30% to 50% in federal fiscal year 2012, which begins Oct. 1. "Fortunately, we have been working now for several months to correct the problem," he said. "As recently as this spring it was still at about 24%, so the fact that it's at 30% now is promising. But we still have a ways to go and we realize that."

ODJFS has been focusing on boosting work participation primarily in "metro counties," which have the highest population, but the agency will soon begin to expand its efforts statewide, he said.

Ohio Job and Family Services Directors Association Executive Director Joel Potts, who has long warned about a shift in TANF policy away from "welfare to work," said counties that administer work programs were collaborating with the state to devise a compliance action plan.

"There's no question, this is going to be a huge challenge for us. That is going to be the heaviest focus of counties over the next 15 months - how do we get our work programs back into compliance? And if we don't, the hit to the state is massive," he said. "We'll do it, we'll make it, but it is not going to be easy."

Cuts in TANF funding to counties will further complicate their efforts to comply with federal requirements because they've reduced staff that will be necessary to monitor work sites where welfare beneficiaries are assigned, he said.

### OHIO APPLALACHIAN REGION COUNTIES RECEIVE DOL GRANT FOR STORM & FLOODING CLEANUP

The U.S. Department of Labor Wednesday announced a \$16,233,360 National Emergency Grant that will create 1,144 temporary jobs to assist in cleanup and recovery efforts in the wake of spring storms and flooding that occurred in Ohio. Communities across 15 counties located in the Appalachian region were affected by the storms, which occurred between April 4 and May 15.

These emergency funds will help local workers provide for their families as they raze destroyed buildings, repair buildings, and clear streets and streams of debris. Grant funds are being awarded to the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services. Of the total award, \$3.5 million will be released initially.

On July 13, the Federal Emergency Management Agency declared a total of 21 Ohio counties eligible for FEMA's Public Assistance Program. This grant will assist 15 of those counties, including Athens, Belmont, Gallia, Guernsey, Hocking, Jackson, Jefferson, Lawrence, Meigs, Monroe, Morgan, Ross, Scioto, Vinton, and Washington. Other counties may be added at a later date if further evaluation warrants their inclusion.

Attached is the Receipt of Benefits While Under Hardship report, as required under ORC 5101.80 (11)(b). This report lists, by county and month, counts of assistance groups that have reached their Ohio Works First (OWF) time limit and received benefits under one of fifteen possible hardship categories.

The OWF Hardship Program, which was put in place to provide extended benefits to those assistance groups that had utilized 36 months of OWF eligibility, has been in operation since October 2000. Assistance groups become eligible for hardship benefits in one of the fifteen general categories developed by the department. Eligibility criteria for each category are developed at the county level and thus may vary from county to county.

The following table lists the definition of each hardship category and of each field on the attached hardship report:

Category Number	Category Abbreviation	Category Text	Definition
1	Age	Age	Eligibility based on the age of one or more assistance group members.
2	Child Prot. Svcs.	Child Protective Services Case Plan	Eligibility based on an assistance group member having a Child Protective Service case which presents a significant barrier to self sufficiency as defined by the county.
3	Dpndt Care Barr.	Dependent Care Barriers	Eligibility based on temporary, irresolvable dependent care (i.e. child, disabled, elderly) issues as defined by the county.
4	Disab/Med Cond.	Disability or Medical Condition	Eligibility based on the disability or medical condition, either temporary or permanent, of any assistance group member.
5	Domest Viol/Fam. Crisis	Domestic Violence/Family Crisis	Eligibility based on an assistance group member being a victim of domestic violence which presents a significant barrier to self-sufficiency as defined by the county.

6	Educat Barr/Trng.	Educational Barriers/Training	Eligibility based on temporary, irresolvable educational issues as defined by the county.
7	Felon/Crim Barr.	Felony/Criminal Barriers	Eligibility based on an assistance group member being unable to become self sufficient while working on overcoming barriers due to felony/criminal convictions.
8	Homeless	Homelessness	Eligibility based on the homelessness of the assistance group.
9	Other	Other	Eligibility based on any other criteria the county may have established.
10	Preg. Child Bearng	Pregnancy/Child Bearing	Eligibility based on issues related to the pregnancy of an assistance group member.
11	Prog. Compli. Pblms.	Program Compliance Problems	Eligibility based on an assistance group member who, through no fault of their own, has not been given the opportunity to participate in work activity leading to self sufficiency.
12	Substc Abuse	Substance Abuse	Eligibility based on an assistance group member being unable to become self sufficient due to chemical or alcohol dependency for which treatment is being sought as defined by the county.
13	Teen Parent	Teen Parents	Eligibility based on at least one parent of an assistance group being under a county specified age.
14	Transp Barr.	Transportation Barriers	Eligibility based on temporary, irresolvable transportation issues as defined by the county.
15	Unemp/Under EmPLY.	Unemployed/ Underemployed	Eligibility based on the unemployment or under-employment of an adult assistance group member.
90	Inter-County Trans.	Inter-County Transfer	A case which had hardship eligibility in a county is relocating to a different county and has yet to have eligibility determined under the new county's eligibility criteria.

Counties have a monthly hardship extension ceiling that is equal to 20 percent of the previous federal fiscal year's average monthly caseload for the county. No county exceeded its federal limit for hardship cases during this reporting period.

The five categories for which most hardship extensions were granted during the period of this report are, in order of frequency from highest to lowest:

- Disability/Medical Condition,
- Dependent Care Barriers,
- Pregnancy/ Childbearing,
- Domestic Violence/ Family Crisis, and
- Other
