CHILDREN SERVICES EFFICIENCY & INNOVATION FUND ACCEPTING APPLICATIONS COUNTIES CAN APPLY FOR UP TO \$250,000

The Ohio Department of Job and Family Services (ODJFS) has announced that it is now accepting applications from public children services agencies for the Children Services Efficiency and Innovation Fund. Applications for this competitive one-time grant are due to ODJFS by November 7.

County agencies may apply for up to \$250,000 out of a total \$6.8 million. The fund is the result of the midbiennium budget review bill passed earlier this year, HB 483, which created a workgroup to examine the current children services delivery system and make a recommendation around how to invest the one-time \$6.8 million appropriation.

OHIO'S UNIFIED PLAN: PUBLIC COMMENTS ACCEPTED THROUGH NOV 21

Existing job training and career exploration programs are often fragmented and uncoordinated. As a result, businesses struggle to find qualified candidates, even as many adults struggle to secure The Governor's Office of Workforce Transformation **Jobs**. employment.



Governor's Office of Workforce Transformation

(OWT) received approval from the Ohio General Assembly under HB 486 (130th General Assembly) to submit a single unified state plan. The plan aligns three federal programs – the Workforce Investment Act (WIA), which funds county OhioMeansJobs Centers and job training and job search assistance programs for adults, dislocated workers and low-income youth; Adult Basic and Literacy Education (ABLE), which funds GED preparation, adult math, reading and literacy courses and English for speakers of other languages; and the Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Improvement Act (Perkins), which provides funding for career technical training for secondary and post-secondary students.

The goal of Ohio's unified workforce plan is to improve outcomes for students, adults and employers by better coordinating local workforce administrators, caseworkers and K-12 educators. Ohio will be just the fourth state to submit a unified plan, and the first to submit a plan that includes Perkins-funded programs. The unified plan will have three goals:

- 1. Help more Ohioans compete for quality jobs that pay a living wage and lead to career advancement;
- 2. Help Ohio employers find the talent they need to succeed and grow; and
- 3. Provide effective and efficient job training aligned to high-demand occupations and employer needs resulting in workplace-valued credentials.

Public comment for Ohio's unified plan will take place from October 21 through November 19, 2014. During this time, you may submit comments directly to the Governor's Office of Workforce Transformation (OWT) office website or attend one of the following five regional hearings. All hearings begin at 9:00 a.m. and end at 12:00 noon.

TELECOMMUNICATION CONTRACT INFORMATION ADDED TO STATE COOPERATIVE PURCHASING WEBSITE



The Ohio Department of Administrative Services (DAS) Cooperative Purchasing Program offers Ohio counties, townships, municipalities, school districts, public libraries, regional park districts and other political subdivisions the benefits and costs savings of buying goods and services through state contracts. Recently, the telecommunication contract information was added to the DAS Cooperative Purchasing Program website making it easier to find the potential cost saving information.

Network Contract Management Services assists DAS to procure computer network-delivered information services, including but not limited to, voice, data, and video cloud services for state and local government. The unit assists DAS in superintending service providers' contracted services under ORC 125.04.

DAS staff has been meeting with county commissioners across the state about the telecommunication contracts, in particular, the Ohio Voice Over IP (VoIP) Program. Portage County JFS and Noble County have adopted the program and will be on the solution by the end of the year. Other counties in process are Ottawa JFS, Holmes and Highland counties. ODNR AWARDS CLEAN OHIO GRANTS TO EXPAND TRAILS IN 15 COUNTIES



The Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) has approved \$6.1 million in Clean Ohio Trails Fund grants to improve outdoor recreational opportunities in 15 counties. The Clean Ohio Trails Fund, administered by ODNR, is one of four components of the Clean Ohio Fund, which restores, protects and connects Ohio's natural and urban places. Ohioans approved the establishment of the \$400 million bond program in 2000. This is the ninth round of funding to be awarded through the Clean Ohio Trails Fund.

The \$6.1 million of funding will be used to develop 25 miles of new trail and for the construction of trail head facilities and a bridge for bike riders and pedestrians. Grant recipients will provide a 25 percent local match for their projects. Read more...

EBOLA-RELATED EMERGENCY FUNDING APPROVED; MONITORING FOR NEW CASES SLATED TO END NOV 4

State officials have indicated they have identified and are monitoring all 164 Ohioans who may be at risk for contracting the Ebola virus, per the recent visit of an infected Texas nurse to Northeast Ohio. The three Ohioans who had direct contact with the Ebola patient are being quarantined, with the remaining 161 being monitored in one of three ways for symptoms. The 21-day incubation period will be over on November 4.

Despite none of the Ohioans currently being monitored for Ebola symptoms testing positive for the virus, the Controlling Board Monday approved an Ohio Department of Health (ODH) emergency request to spend \$300,000 on protective equipment for medical personnel. The Board approved the personal protection equipment request and granted permission to waive competitive selection so that the department can contract with a Cincinnati bio-recovery company for contamination clean-up services at a cost of up to \$500,000. Both requests were added to the agenda late last week as emergency items following confirmation that a Dallas nurse who had contracted Ebola had visited Ohio from October 10-13. The majority of the spending approved will come from existing federal emergency preparedness grants.

The additional equipment, which is at or above the current federal safety standards, will more than quadruple the state's current supply of items that would be used by health care workers if an Ebola patient were to be admitted to an Ohio hospital. All Ohio hospitals have completed Ebola preparedness training.

Prior to learning that the nurse had been visiting Northeast Ohio immediately before being diagnosed, the state hosted a day-long exercise on Ebola preparedness, which included a simulation. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention team stationed in Ohio applauded ODH and local health departments and hospitals on their quick response to ensure containment of the virus, crediting the emergency response foundations that were already in place for the state's ability to jump into collaborating at the state, local and federal levels while keeping residents informed.

FEDERAL ACTIVITIES

OHIO RECEIVES FEDERAL FUNDS TO FIGHT ALGAE

U.S. Senator Sherrod Brown and U.S. Rep Marcy Kaptur (Dist. 9-Toledo) joined the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency - Region 5 to announce that \$8.6 million in federal Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI) grants will fund projects in Ohio, Michigan and Indiana to reduce the amount of phosphorus entering Lake Erie.

The Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) was awarded roughly \$5.9 million, including a \$1.68 million grant for local soil and water conservation districts to pay farmers in the Maumee watershed up to \$25 per acre to plant phosphorus-absorbing cover crops on vulnerable land, according to U.S. EPA's fact sheet. A separate \$1.5 million grant will help ODNR and soil and water conservation districts pay farmers in the lower Maumee Watershed \$65 per acre to incorporate precision soil testing and fertilizer management techniques. Another \$1.5 million award will enable the agency to fund livestock manure storage structures and advance development of comprehensive nutrient management plans.



The Ohio Environmental Protection Agency was awarded \$1.55 million for a three-year program to increase monitoring of Maumee River Watershed tributaries.

In August, the U.S. EPA met with state officials to identify ways to reduce harmful algal blooms in the western Lake Erie basin. At the time, the task force overseeing the GLRI, announced that \$12 million would be made available for priority projects. U.S. EPA said it will soon announce additional funding for projects that will be implemented by federal agencies. GLRI was launched in 2010 to accelerate efforts to protect and restore the lakes by strategically targeting the most serious threats to the ecosystem. Read more...

USDA CLIMATE HUBS WEBSITE LAUNCHED

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Climate Hubs web site was launched on Wednesday. The new site provides a portal for farmers, ranchers, forest landowners, and others to find useful, practical information to help cope with the challenges and stressors caused by a changing climate. The site provides resources related to drought, fire risks, pests and diseases, climate variability, and heat stress, and links users to the network of USDA conservation programs and resources that provide producers with technical and financial assistance to manage risks. NEW STATE-BY-STATE "MADE IN RURAL AMERICA" REPORT RELEASED

As part of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) commitment to strengthening rural economies, a new state-by-state "Made in Rural America" report illustrating the impact of USDA investments in rural communities has been released. Each state factsheet highlights specific USDA investments in rural businesses, manufacturing, energy, water and other infrastructure development. They also outline how USDA is helping rural communities attract businesses and families by investing in housing and broadband.

These fact sheets reflect USDA's efforts to strengthen the "four pillars" of a new economy in rural America:

1) developing a robust bio-based economy; 2) promoting exports and production agriculture fueled by increased productivity and research; 3) encouraging conservation including land management, stewardship and outdoor recreational opportunities; and 4) building a strong local and regional food system to harness entrepreneurial innovation and help small and medium-sized family farms succeed in rural America.
